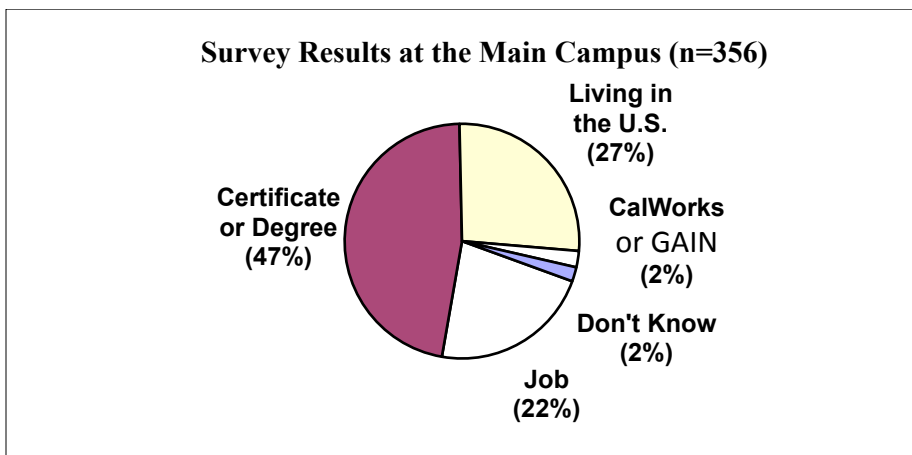


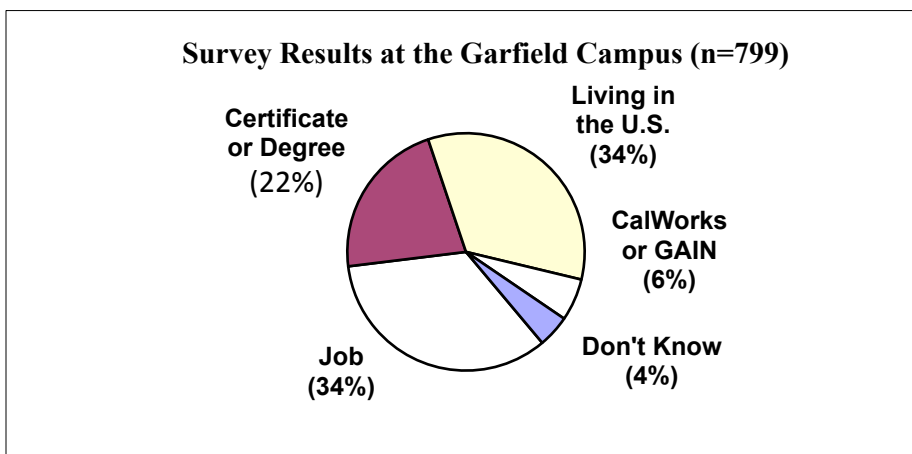

1. Why are you taking English class? Choose your first, most immediate reason.

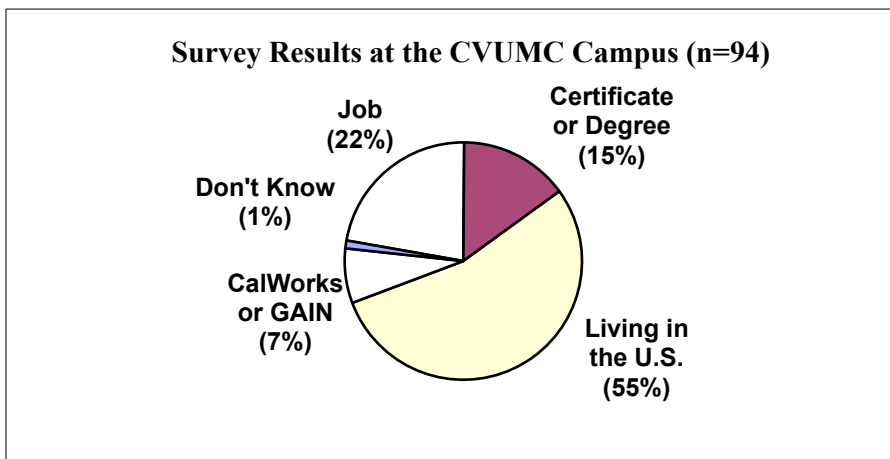
The top reasons that students at the Main campus take English classes are to earn a certificate or degree (47%), followed by to live in the U.S. (27%), and to get a job (22%).



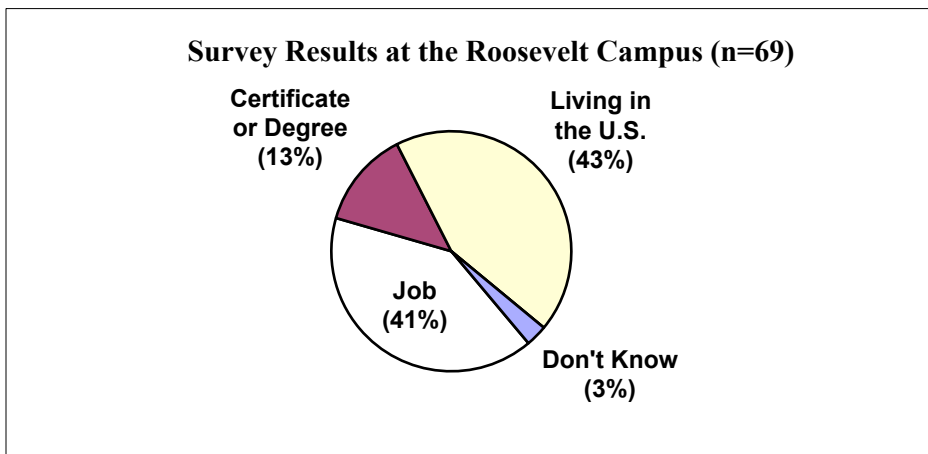
The top reasons that students at the Garfield campus take English classes are to get a job (34%), tied with to live in the U.S. (34%), followed by to earn a certificate or degree (22%).



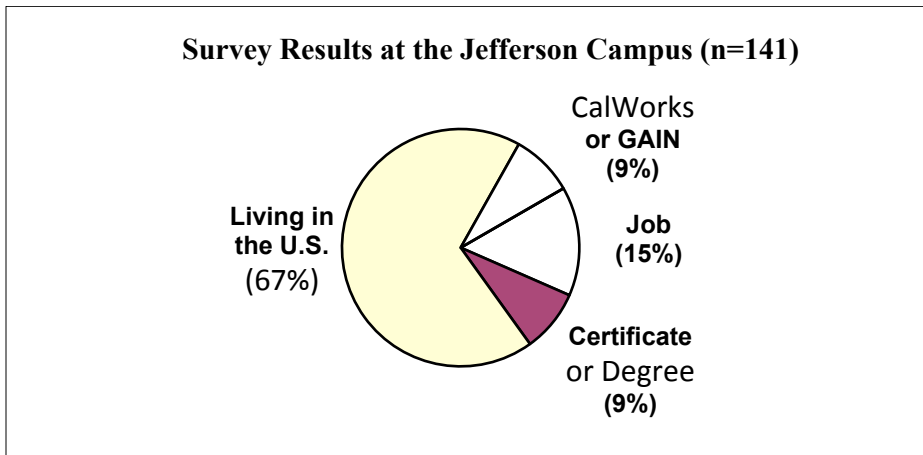
The top reasons students at the CVUMC campus take English classes are to live in the U.S. (55%), followed by to get a job (22%), and to earn a certificate or degree (15%).



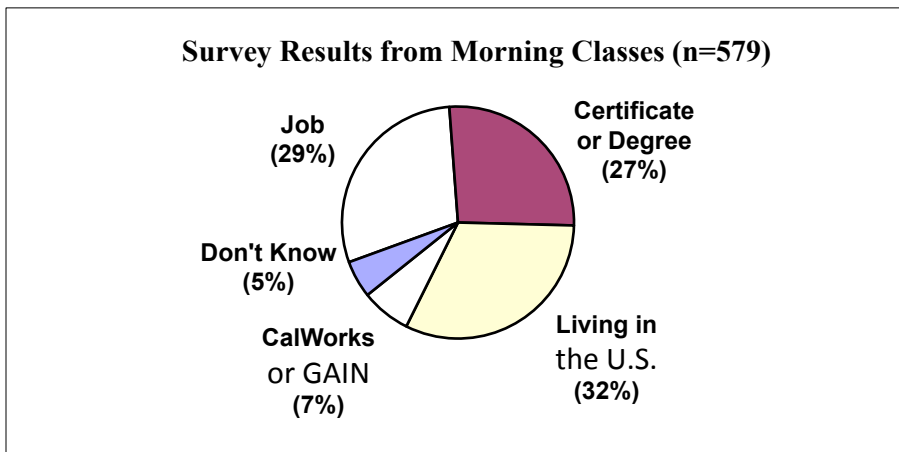
The top reasons that students at the Roosevelt campus take English classes are to live in the U.S. (43%), followed by to get a job (41%), and to earn a certificate or degree (13%).



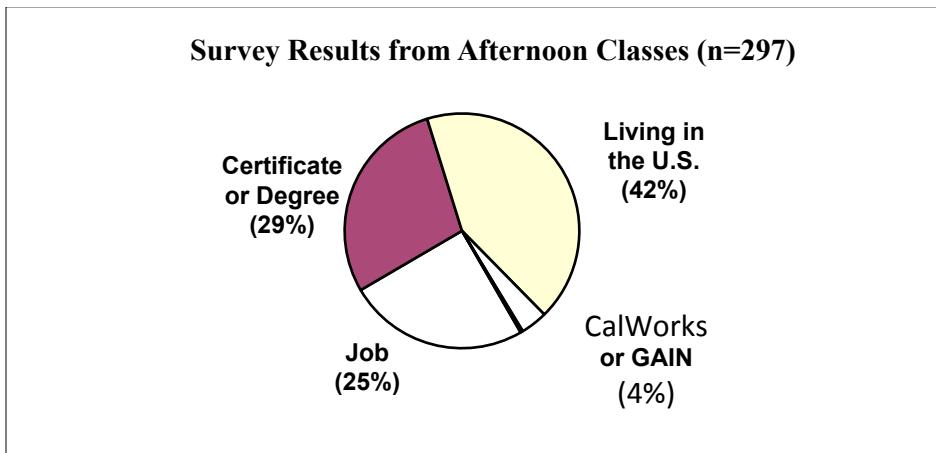
The top reasons that students at the Jefferson campus take English classes are overwhelmingly to live in the U.S. (67%), followed by to get a job (15%).



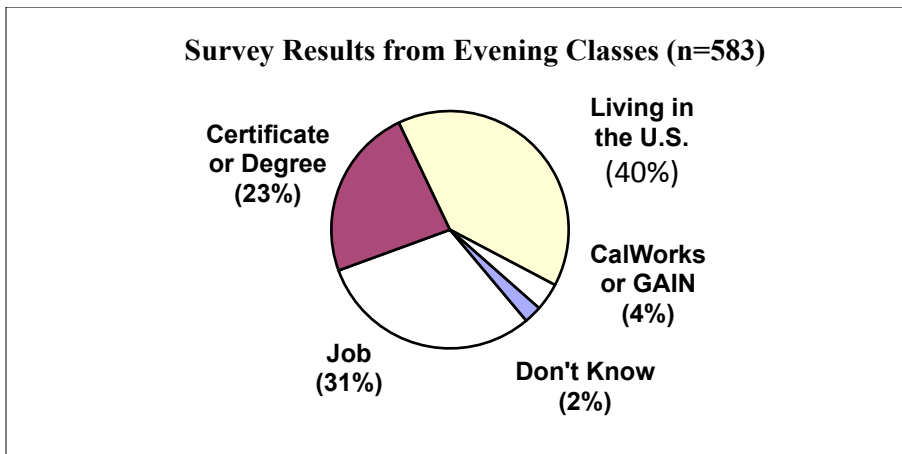
The top reasons that students during morning hours take English classes are to live in the U.S. (32%), followed by to get a job (29%), and to earn a certificate or degree (27%).



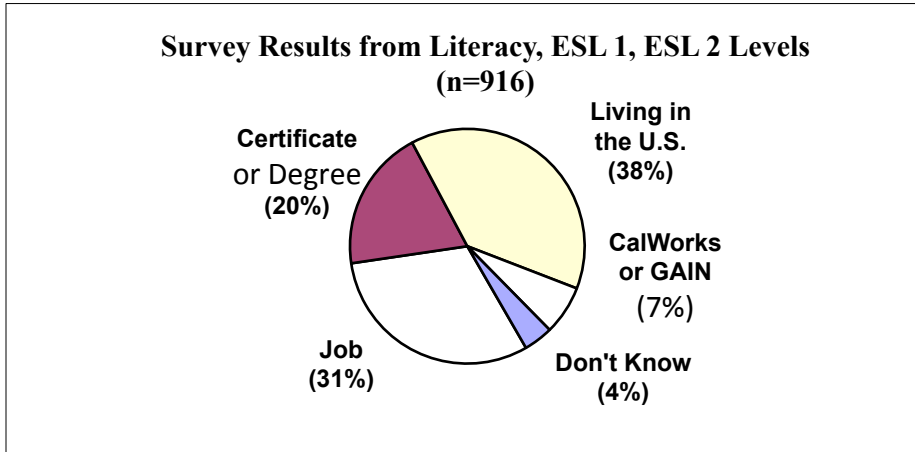
The top reasons that students in the afternoon hours take English classes are to live in the U.S. (42%), to earn a certificate or degree (29%), and to get a job (25%).



The top reasons that students in evening hours take English courses are to live in the U.S. (40%), followed by to get a job (31%), and to earn a certificate or degree (23%).



The top reasons that students at the Literacy, ESL 1, and ESL 2 levels take English classes are to live in the U.S. (38%), to get a job (31%), and to earn a certificate or degree (20%).



The top reasons that students at the ESL 3, ESL 4, and ESL 5 levels take English classes are to earn a certificate or degree (37%), closely followed by to live in the U.S. (35%), and to get a job (25%).
